- Best practice record keeping.

John attended a Varroa Champions meeting in Brisbane - consensus was from everyone that not enough people are checking their hives for Varroa and registering their results on Bee123. We need to Test - Test - Test and Register - Register - Register.

Testing should be done every 16 weeks with an alcohol wash. We need to know the results for all areas. Varroa.org.au is an excellent website for information. If your hive becomes infested, call DAF and they will come and help manage your hive at no cost. Main point is to check regularly and detect the mites early or it may be too late and you will lose your hives - it is treatable if detected early.

If you cannot attend the Maroochydore Workshop, there will be workshops in other locations in due course. We will keep you updated./

Please ensure that you assist with the cleaning up following extraction of honey.


Borrowing the Clubs spinners to extract honey at home:

BEES IN THE NEWS

Bees are the latest victims of plastic pollution: Earth.com By Andrei Ionescu

Nano- and microplastic particles (NMP) are increasingly contaminating both urban and rural landscapes, bringing bees and other beneficial insects into contact with them.

If insects ingest these plastic particles from food or the air, it can damage their organs and alter their behavior, hindering their ability to perform essential ecosystem services like pollination and pest control.

Plastic pollution thus poses considerable risks to biodiversity, agricultural production, and global food security, according to a new review study conducted by an international team including researchers from the University of Freiburg.

While the harmful effects of NMP in water and on individual species are well documented, there has been a lack of systematic reviews on how these particles affect agricultural ecosystems.

The researchers identified different sources through which NMP end up on agricultural land, including plastic films, fertilizers, polluted water, and atmospheric depositions.

These plastic particles accumulate in the soil, and important pollinators and pest control insects ingest them from the air and food or use them to build nests.

The study established that bees' ingestion of plastic leads to damage to their digestive systems, weakening of their immune systems, and changes in their behaviour. This makes bees more susceptible to diseases, possibly causing

them to pollinate plants less effectively.

Pioneering robot system enables 24/7 monitoring of honeybee behavior: Phys Org October 24 by Durham University

Researchers at Durham University, in collaboration with international partners, have developed a robotic system that allows for continuous, long-term observation of honeybee colonies.

The robotic system collects a wide range of data, including the queen's movement patterns, egg-laying behavior, population counts, breeding success, and a continuously updated map of comb contents. This comprehensive approach allows for a deeper understanding of the social self-regulation within bee colonies.

The insights we're gaining could revolutionize our understanding of these complex social insects and potentially contribute to their conservation."
